

Statement on Recent Violence Against Black People Nationwide

Although the Committee on Afro-American Studies seldom takes stands on political issues, we find ourselves so outraged and appalled by recent events that we feel compelled to speak out. Within the last year there has been a rising tide of violence directed against black people in this country and a resurgence of the Klu Klux Klan and the Nazi Party. Waves of homicides against black adults in Buffalo, and black children in Atlanta, the assassination attempt on Vernon Jordan, the growing support for Klan political candidates in Detroit and Southern California, are all symptoms of the racial hatreds which are still deep in the fiber of American socie-The recent court decisions in the killings of a black man in Miami and members of the Communist Workers Party in Greensboro have contributed to the impression that it is "open season" on blacks and their supporters.

Closer to home, the recent cross burning incident at Williams College and the continuing threats received by black students there remind us that small liberal arts colleges are not cloistered retreats but reflections of the larger society. Last spring's discovery of Klan and Nazi literature on our own campus, the racism subtle and otherwise here at Bowdoin and the stereotypes of blacks held by our own students indicate the enormous task still to be done.

We, the Committee on Afro-American Studies condemn the increasingly overt activities of racist organizations and the growing racial violence in this country, and we feel that as an intellectual community we should address the issues of racism directly. We will sponsor a series of colloquia during the spring semester to encourage discussion, reflection and self examination.
